Peregrine Falcon watch



With the help of Michael Padmore and the Hawk and Owl Trust the Peregrine watch earlier this year was a great success, the watch point set up in the college to enjoy views of the pair of falcons nesting on Jumbo was attended by a large number of students, staff and the general public. We hope to run viewing opportunities again next year.

Following on from this the college's Environment Committee and Conservation Volunteers have announced a new project to establish a colony of swifts at the college.

In the past two decades the population of swifts in Britain has halved and one of the reasons is believed to be the lack of suitable nest sites in modern buildings.

Essex Swifts expert John Smart has visited the college to advise on suitable locations for up to 20 swift nest boxes and the north face of the mid-site building looks like being the perfect site. Students are looking into ways to raise funds to buy the specially designed woodcrete boxes and to hire a cherry-picker as the boxes need to be over 5 metres above the ground.
